- Q. What is Babbitt Metal?
- A. An alloy, consisting of 9 parts of tin and 1 part of copper used for journal box bearings; so called from its inventor, Issac Babbitt, of Boston. Some variations have been made, and among the published compositions are:

Copper 1 1 5 5 Tin 10 50

Another formula substitutes zinc for antimony. The term is commonly applied to any white alloy for bearings, as distinguished from the metals or brasses in which copper predominates.
