FROM THE BOARD

BY-LAW CHANGE

The following by-law change will be added to Article III. Section 4 shall read: Three (3) directors shall be elected during the November meeting each year or at such other time as designated by the board and shall commence their terms of office on the first day of January following the election. They shall serve a two (2) year term of office. In the event a director must be replaced due to a vacancy for any reason, his replacement shall be selected by a majority vote of the board of directors remaining, and shall complete the term of office of the person he is chosen to replace.

The following by-law change will be added to Article X: Impeachment/Expulsion. Also an additional sentence may be added to the existing Article X: A member may be expelled for unbecoming conduct, as seen by the board. Any expulsion may be appealed to the

general membership.

The proposed by-law changes and additions as listed above will be voted on by the membership at our next monthly meeting, (3-18-83).

- Q. What should be the duty of an engineer before starting out of the yard or round-house?
- A. To look at the crown-sheet and flues and be sure that the water-level is all right; to see that the fire is good; to examine all parts of the engine and tender to see that there is nothing amiss or broken; to test the rod keys by trying to drive them back with a copper hammer; to see that bolts and nuts are home; that the brakes go on and come off easily; that there is sufficient fuel and water in the tender; that all tools for repairs and for firing are at hand; that the headlight is all right and all lamps are at hand, filled, and ready for service, all signals at hand and ready for use; that there is a supply of oil and tallow, and that the sand-box is full of good dry sharp unfrozen sand.

CLINKERS!

For those of you who are interested in train brake systems, here is an excerpt from "THE WHISTLE" (The Official Publication of the British Columbia Society of Model Engineers). President Lindsay McDonnell explains, ... "An electric vacuum pump is now fitted to each caboose and with the batteries (24V) provide an emergency brake that the conductor can apply by pulling the lever on the right side. It works extremely well. With 10 cars fully loaded (30 passengers), the pump evacuates the line almost instantly and can bring our 4-8-4 to a grinding halt even on full throttle. We think our system of vacuum brakes on all cars is excellent with this addition making for even better safety.
