#### Transportation series

As the 13th issue in the continuing Transportation Series, the USPS will release an 11-cent stamp featuring an 1890s railroad caboose Feb. 3 during the Chicago Philatelic Fair.

The caboose depicted on the stamp is similar to one used during the last century by a logging

company raftread in the Sierra Nevadas.

Used to transport equipment and crews to and from logging sites, the tiny caboones played an important role in the development of the West. Teday, only a few of the cars are still in service, operating mainly as tourist sitractions.


