The outbound lower yard switch at the boxcar is being rebuilt using new points made from steel rail. New stock and closure rails have been installed as well. Thanks to Al Shelley, Karle Mahler, and Ross Crawford for their time and effort.

The three remaining grade crossings in the addition were completed on March 13. This was a joint effort with Yardmaster Lee Frechette. Thanks to all that helped pour the concrete, including Bill Yoder, Glen Bell, Butch Floyd, Richard Lutrel, Will Jordon, Paul Clifton, Red Hadler and his friend Ron. Bill Yoder made a neat concrete stamp "SVLS 2003" that was used to imprint the three crossings. Special thanks to Glen Bell who arranged for Teichert to donate about ten yards of concrete for the project at no charge, saving the club over one thousand dollars.

The remaining crossings near Oasis, the two Oasis sidings and main line through Oasis, may have construction started later in April, time and weather permitting. Planned construction will be in two phases: the first phase will consist of the removal of the track panels, installation of concrete and rebar for the rail base pad, and replacing the ballast and original track panels; the second phase will add the steel rail and final concrete pad for the grade crossing. The second phase will be done sometime after the spring meet, possibly this fall.

Two track panels were removed on the southbound mainline along the east side of the addition along Hillview hill to allow Yardmaster Lee Frechette to excavate a trench for irrigation pipe installation from Midway to the east fence line. The panels are back in place with a temporary bridge over the trench. This will be a slow order portion of track until the pipe installation is completed. Watch for the caution sign when running in this area.

Rail joiner bars are continuing to be made by Jack Friedman and Ross Crawford. Thanks to both for their involvement in this important task. It is tedious and

TECHNICAL NOTES

TRAMMING YOUR TRUCKS:

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rately using two sharp points on a bar which is set with a steel rule. This method was widely used in industry during the industrial revolution.

Now, we all know how to check wheel set back to back and gauge but there are two other considerations that seriously affect wheel and rail sear and also truck performance.

These are axle parallelism and wheel alignment. Axle parallelism is established when the holes are drilled equidistant in both side frames. However, you can check it by measuring the distance between the front and rear wheels on each side of the truck. A large inside caliper is good for this measurement. Wheel alignment is checked by placing a straight edge along the inside of the front and rear wheels on one side. If you can't push them into alignment, then you must rework the truck. If you can push them into alignment, then you can install washers between the wheel and side frame on the axle or axles. This procedure presumes that your back-to-back dimensions are close to the same. Also you should shoot for approximately .020 total end play on each axle. If you need help, see me at the railroad on work days.



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exacting work to cut, drill, and deburr dozens of bars. All new and replacement rail installations use the rail joiner bars instead of the Spall-type joiners.

Milon Thorley and Keith Berry have sprayed the entire right-of-way with pre-emergence weed control. Spring is here and everything is growing, especially the weeds. Keith has also been busy replacing ties where needed. Thanks to both for their time.

Track tasks to be done between now and the Spring Meet in May will be: bridge and trestle lind seed oil application (volunteers needed), tie replacement, switch point installation, light track ballasting and alignment, switch throw renovation and installation. Several areas of track need immediate attention, including the northbound main at Hillview yard, the upper/lower yard switch road base in the park area, removing a hump in the inbound lower yard track, elevation of the outside rail on the north hill curve into the park from the addition. Particular attention will be paid to rail joints on curves using the Spall-type slip connectors and their replacement using bar type rail joiners.

Work days are held on all Tuesdays and many Saturdays. Saturday work days planned for April and May are: April 19 (coincident with the Easter Egg run day), April 26, May 3 (coincident with the SVLS run day), and the afternoon of May 10. Other days are available as well. Contact the Track Superintendent if you would like to contribute your time and expertise to a worthwhile and important effort for the club.

SAFETY RULES FOR THE
MONTH

203 Any engine about to back up, must give the correct signal from the trainman or switchman. All engines backing up shall run at reduced speeds.

303 All trainmen and engineers must be able to demonstrate thorough knowledge of basic rules of save operation to the satisfaction of the Trainmaster or his designated alternate and in addition all engineers shall be thoroughly briefed on the individual engines they are to operate.

415 All locomotives operating during periods of low visibility or after sunset shall be equipped with a working headlight that may be seen clearly for a distance of at least 150 feet and sufficient lighting in the locomotive cab to read the gauges and see the controls clearly.
