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
TRACK UPDATE





additional work for a number of our members. A collapsed pipe on the supply side of the system allowed the introduction of a lot (actually, a breathtakingly great amount) of silt and grit into the sprinkler network. The result? Clogged sprinkler heads that require repeated disassembly, cleaning flushing out and reassembly. This is proving to be a very slow and labor intensive task, and it doesn't look to be completed very soon. The other result? Many grassy areas have turned brown, and we've lost some plants. The grass will survive, other areas will need to be replanted. Our thanks to those folks who've spent many hours at the park working this problem.

The good news department – The Garden Railway continues to be a real crowd pleaser. Ongoing improvements are attracting more and more operators, and new members! Tuesday seems to be the big day for operations and work, with a good number of folks at the club.

More good news – We waited for the hottest part of the year to begin refurbishing and upgrading the tracks between the turntable and transfer track leads up to the boxcar yard. This will be an ongoing project, done in such a way to minimize operating disruptions. Happily, a lot of this trackage is in the shade for the first half of the day. Some of the refurb work will involve the dual gauge track. That one additional rail will make the task exponentially more difficult and time consuming, especially through the turnouts. Thought has been given to eliminating some of the 3rd rail, unless those who use it can be counted upon to assist in the refurbishment.

In closing, a personal note. The SVLSRM has gained a new member. On July 7th my Son Ian and my Daughter in Law Anna welcomed Ethan Alexander into the world! He's 7 lbs 7 oz, 22 inches of healthy baby boy and future live steamer. Aside from being a bit sleep deprived, Mom and Dad are doing well, too.





SAFETY RULES FOR THE MONTH

1.05 Obligation to Transport
No engineer is obligated to haul any passengers on his train.

2.06 Wheel Dimensions and Coupler HeightsAll wheel dimensions and coupler height standards shall conform to IBLS standards. A copy of these standards can be found on the SVLSRM webpage.

3.03 Duties of Trainmaster

The Trainmaster or designee shall be responsible for the condition of all railroad rolling stock and preventative maintenance of all SVLSRM owned rail equipment. They will keep accurate records of maintenance and modifications to rolling stock and oversee boiler testing. They shall check wheel gauges for compliance with established standards on members' and visitors' equipment. The Trainmaster or designee is responsible for the issuance of all SVLSRM rail equipment for use at any and all activities.

4.02 Requirement of Conductor

All trains hauling passengers shall have at least one qualified Conductor on the last car of the train, or facing backward on the rear seat of the Engineer car. It shall be their responsibility to protect the rear of the train and to assist the Engineer in the operation of the train. Each Conductor on duty shall have a whistle (police type) and a red flag or light on the train.

Doepke YardBird

This toy train was donated to the club several years ago by Steve Hoxie. It was his train toy when he was young, and has kept it all these years since the 1950's.

While it did still move on the tracks, and in much need of a paint job, the axels were just about worn through as the axels did not have bearings.

Thank to Andy Berchelli for restoring the body with a great paint job and getting a new logo to restore its looks.

Meanwhile back at the ranch Bill Yoder took on the task of rebuilding the trucks. New shafts were needed, and a little welding to provide round holes for the bushings for the axels, and updated the side rods with steel shoulder screws to keep the rods from binding.


