SAFETY RULES FOR THE MONTH



1.03 Passengers and Visitors
General public, when permitted
within the steaming bays, shall be
escorted by a SVLSRM member.
General public who need to get close
to tracks for photography shall have
an escort to keep a lookout for

oncoming trains or equipment movement.

2.04 Periods of Low Visibility

All trains running during periods of low visibility or after sunset shall be equipped with a marker light, or with lights on the rear of the last car, displaying a red light to the rear and visible for at least 150 Ft.

3.04 Unloading/loading

Locomotives and equipment shall be unloaded and loaded only at the facilities provided at the steaming bays. All vehicles shall be removed from the loading area as soon as possible after loading and unloading. Small equipment may be unloaded/loaded at any siding.

4.10 Passenger Train equipment

Each public passenger train shall be equipped with proper documentation materials i.e.; clip board, Conductor report, incident/accident forms, operable writing pen, whistle, two way radio, red flag, and current rules book.

30 Years ago: As many of you know, our goal to complete the first loop in the expansion area in time for the Spring Meet was reached and thoroughly tested during the meet. The engineering of the bridge proved to be sound, showing no signs of strain even under the weight of Stan Hindsley's big U.P. Northern and John Hain's 6" scale 4-6-2 Tintern Abbey. Neither of these engines had any problems negotiating the "S" curve at the north west end of the new loop. By the way, the "S" curve is also on a grade and presents a challenge to any engine with a moderate load. So far this year about 1150 feet of new track has been laid.. We hope to have the second loop completed by the Fall Meet. This will more than double the size of the existing railroad and give us close to 4,000 feet of mainline. Ed Spall deserves a lot of credit for his time and effort. He has built at

least 90% of the track panels needed. - Doug Fulton, Superintendent
