The Pacific has had injector issues on and off for about 6 months. We had Brandon and then Anthony Duarte, " the Injector Whisperer," take a look at the Fall meet. Debris and dirt issues coming from the tender water tank. Thanks for the help and advice Anthony! The water tank is getting another coat of sealant and filters added. Brandon also found we have a suspension problem on the fireman's side. We are looking into rebuilding the problem area.

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Facts & figures of the past.

The Track was laid well before the incorporation of The Sacramento Valley Live Steamers Corporation. "The track was finished in May of 1973. A ceremony was held for the completion of the 1700 foot oval", at the East end of Cordova Park later Hagan Park in Rancho Cordova, California.

"The first passenger siding was located along the man made creek in Hagan Park just in about 15 to 20 feet from the sidewalk. We pitched an open tent or awning to keep the sun off.

At that time one-inchers (one inch to the foot scale) were allowed to haul the public. Ed Yungling's engine was run by his son Don. He had a 0-6-0 type engine."



"We had only 5 steaming bays at first and one turntable. All of the steel for this project was paid for by Doc Harris," author of the national best selling book, "I'm OK, You're OK". "Doc was a very interesting character and twice rear ended other trains." (Maybe the title should have been I'm OK, You're in My Way!)

"Doc Harris and Ken Spicer had engines that could pull the public." (Note: the Doc Harris engine was later purchased by Darrel McWhirk who later donated it to The SVLS Corporation. This engine is was renumbered as SVLS 1973
