


President's Report

By the time you are reading this, our Spring Meet and 50th Anniversary will be

less than a month away. Much has been accomplished, yet so much more needs to be done. The bridge rebuild project has been completed, the turntable leads rebuild is complete. Steaming bay and transfer track extensions are done.



Alan Shifley has been working tirelessly on installing new signals and electric turnout machines in and around the Hillview siding and yard area. He anticipates having them operational by the meet. As with all operational signals on the railroad, train operators will be expected to abide by, and follow all signal indications.

None of these projects would have been possible without a huge effort by a group of dedicated volunteers. For fear of leaving somebody out, I'll simply extend a hearty "Thank You" to those who answered the call and pitched in!

As mentioned, there's still more to do. Several sidings and spurs need additional ballast and leveling, and some mainline areas need attention. Red for a Reason Signal System Upgrades By Alan Shifley

The signal system at SVLS has been undergoing some significant upgrades. Changes for this year include new signals and powered turnouts at Hillview West and the removal from service all nonfunctioning signals.

The signals at SVLS are more than just decorations. The signal system is designed to provide an additional level of safety for train operations, especially at locations where



tracks cross and converge, locations where turnouts automatically realign for the mainline after a train enters the siding, and sections of track with limited sight distance.


Signals are Red for a Reason. A Steady Red signal means STOP your train at least 5 feet BEFORE the red signal and wait until something other than Steady Red is displayed. A red signal may indicate that there is a train in the block ahead or that a train is moving towards you on a conflicting route (even if it's not yet visible to you) or a turnout is not aligned. Don't risk derailing your train or causing a collision with another train by passing a Steady Red signal.

Other signal indications include Flashing Red, Yellow, Flashing Yellow and Green. These indications tell you what to expect ahead. Look for more information about these signal indications at the Spring meet. Bottom line is Steady Red means DO NOT PASS the signal. Anything else means it is okay to pass the signal.


Two signals together, one above the other, tell you which route you are set up for. Both signals showing Steady Red means neither route is cleared – DO NOT PASS the signal. Otherwise, the upper signal indicates the mainline route and the lower indicates the diverging route.



As we get together to celebrate 50 years at SVLS and share the rails with an incredible variety of scale railroad equipment, let's keep it fun and KEEP IT SAFE!



SACRAMENTO VALLEY LIVE STEAMERS GOLD SPIKE CEREMONY May 19th and 20th, 1973 REPORT AND PHOTOS BY LARRY H, BADGER



More than 350 persons were on hand for the First Annual Meet and Golden Spike Ceremony at the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers' track at Rancho Cordova Park.

With as many as 20 engines of various sizes filling the partially-completed steaming bays, the two-day meet saw engines of all classes and sizes operating over the dual-gauge (4½" and 7½") 2200 foot loop. Blair Phillips (above), President of the Golden Gate Live Steamers, pulled passengers behind his 1½" scale "LION" all day Sunday. The little coal-burner out-performed several larger locomotives on the 3% grades.

Saturday saw mostly operation and registration with a lot of discussion and note-taking in the steaming areas. Saturday night, club members honored track boss Ed Yungling's efforts during the past year spearheading construction of the track which was first opened to aroundthe-loop operation last January...just over nine months from the day the first spike was driven.

Youngling, who took time from construction of his 1½" scale Southern Pacific cab-forward and a 15" narrow gauge engine to push the line to completion, was given a steam gauge and waterglass from a long-since scrapped cabforward in recognition of his efforts.

Harry Dixon (left) Western Region Secretary for the BLS, furnished the solid gold spike for the occasion and was assisted in driving it into a special walnut tie by Cordova Park officials, Ed Youngling and SVLS President Allen Shelly.

We will be able to steam up and put your smaller equipment together on the sidings on the G layout, however, please consider others should they be wishing to stage their equipment also on the various sidings. Don't forget the first weekends of the each month are the public run events, hours 11:00 to 3:00. 


